The Book of Ezekiel Chapters 15-17: Pictures of Failure (Part 2) Lesson 16 "The Unfaithful Wife" (Part 1) Ezekiel 16:1-14 (ANSWERS) December 6, 2020

Recap from Lesson 15:

- The three messages recorded in these chapters (Ezek. 15-17) were given to the Elders who were seated before him in his own House, men who were outwardly appeared Interested in hearing God's word but inwardly were Idolatrous. (Ezek. 14:1-3)
 - o In these three messages, Ezekiel spoke about a <u>Vine</u>, an <u>Unfaithful</u> Wife, and three <u>Shots</u> from a <u>Tree</u>, and each of these images conveyed God's truth to those who really wanted to understand.

1. The Worthless Vine (Ezek. 15:1-8)

- a. The vine is an image found frequently in Scripture. Jesus compared <u>Himself</u> to a vine and His <u>Disciples</u> to branches in the vine, because we depend <u>Wholly</u> on Him for life and faithfulness. (Jn. 15)
- **b.** Other times, in Scripture, the vine speaks of the Gentile society and the Nation of Israel.
- **c.** Ezekiel's contribution to the vineyard story is to point out the <u>Worthlessness</u> of the vine that does <u>Not</u> bear fruit.
- d. Those of <u>Us</u> who are branches in Jesus Christ, the true Vine, need to take this lesson to heart! If we fail to abide in Christ, we <u>Lose</u> our spiritual power, wither, and fail to <u>Bear</u> fruit for His glory. (Jn. 15:6; 6:37; Rom. 8:1)

Session 16

Background:

- This long chapter contains some of the most vivid language found anywhere in Scripture.
 It is address to the City of Jerusalem but refers to the entire Nation.
 - This chapter traces the spiritual history of the Jews from <u>"Birth"</u> (God's call of Abraham) through <u>"Marriage"</u> (God's covenant with the people), and up to their <u>"Spiritual Prostitution"</u> (Idolatry) and the sad consequences that followed (Ruin and Exile).
 - O But as we read the chapter, we must see not only the <u>Dark</u> background of Israel's wickedness but also the bright <u>Light</u> of God's <u>Love</u> and <u>Grace</u>. (Rom. 5:20)

1. Israel Experienced a Great Love (Ezek. 16:1-4)

- **a.** Israel is pictured here as an <u>Unwanted child</u>- Exposed, <u>Abandoned</u>, and left to die, but she was then <u>Rescued</u> by the Lord and became His wife.
 - i. Many Jews were excessively proud of their heritage and called the Gentiles "Dogs," but the Lord reminded them that they had descended from the <u>Amorites</u> and <u>Hittites</u>. (Gen. 10:15-16)
 - ii. It was not until the time of <u>David</u> that Jerusalem belonged to the <u>Jews</u> and became the capital of the nation. (<u>Josh. 10:5</u>)
 - 1. For the matter, their esteemed ancestor <u>Abraham</u> was an idol worshipping <u>Pagan</u> when God graciously called him!

- **b.** The parents of the newborn child did not even give her the human treatment that every baby deserves.
 - i. They did not cut the umbilical cord, wash the child, rub her skin with salt... Without <u>Pity</u> or Compassion, they <u>Threw</u> her out into the open field and exposed her to the elements.
 - ii. The Lord passed by, saw the helpless body, took pity on her, and <u>Saved</u> her. By the <u>Power</u> of His word He gave her life, and this was wholly an act of <u>Divine</u> grace. (Acts 7:2)
 - iii. The baby grew and became a young woman ready for <u>Marriage</u>. The phrase "Came to excellent ornaments" in Ezek. 16:7 means "Come to full maturity."
 - By now, Israel was enslaved in the land of Egypt, so the Lord would have to redeem her. He wanted her for Himself so He "Passed by" again and <u>Claimed</u> her for His own bride. (Ezek. 6:6, 8)

2. Israel Committed a Great Sin (Ezek. 16:15-34)

- a. When Israel became <u>Prosperous</u> and famous, she <u>Forgot</u> the Lord who gave her such great <u>Wealth</u>, and she began to use God's generous gifts for <u>Worshipping</u> idols. (Hos. 2:8, 13-14)
 - i. Like the ignorant heathen nations around her, she <u>Worshipped</u> the creation rather than the <u>Creator</u> and abandoned her <u>"Husband"</u> for false gods. (Rom. 1:21-25)
 - ii. She did not simply occasionally commit adultery, as wicked as that is. She became a <u>Professional</u> prostitute, but unlike other prostitutes, she sought out her lovers and **Paid** them to **Sin** with her.
 - iii. She took the very <u>Treasures</u> and blessing God generously gave to her and devoted them to the making and worshipping of idols. (Ezek. 16:20-21)
- The Lord <u>Desires</u> and <u>Deserves</u> our full and compete devotion. (2 Cor. 11:1-4)
- Rev. 2:4, "Nevertheless I have somewhat <u>Against</u> thee, because thou has <u>Left</u> thy first <u>Love</u>."
