The Book of Ezekiel Chapters 15-17: Pictures of Failure Lesson 15 "The Worthless Vine" Ezekiel 15:1-8 (ANSWERS) November 15, 2020

Recap from Lesson 14:

- 1. The Lying Prophets (Vss. 1-16)
 - **a.** Four times in this paragraph God declares that the false prophets saw vanity (Nothingness) and spoke lies.
 - **b.** They spoke out of their own <u>Imaginations</u>, and their <u>"Inspirations"</u> was self-induced.
- 2. The Lying Sorceresses (Vss. 17-23)
 - a. The gift of prophecy was **Not** given exclusively to men.
 - i. The Jewish women Ezekiel was **Exposing** were more like sorceresses who claimed to be prophetesses.

"False Piety" (Ezekiel 14:1-11)

- 1. He Exposed Their Hidden Sin (Vss. 1-5)
- 2. He Called them to Repent (Vss. 6-11)
 - **a.** It is the <u>Condition</u> of the person's heart that <u>Determines</u> the response to the Lord's test, for God deals with people according to their **Hearts**.

Session 15

Background:

- The prophet Ezekiel <u>Remained</u> silent except when the Word of the Lord came to him, and God permitted him to speak. (Ezek. 3:25-27)
- The three messages recorded in these Chapters (Ezek. 15-17) were given to the <u>Elders</u> who were seated before him in his own <u>House</u>, men who were outwardly appeared <u>Interested</u> in hearing God's word but inwardly were <u>Idolatrous</u>. (Ezek. 14:1-3)
- The Lord knew that neither the elders nor the people took Ezekiel's messages seriously because they saw him as a religious <u>Entertainer</u> whose words were only beautiful music. (Ezek. 33:30-33)
 - Whenever God's people <u>Turn</u> from His Word and become <u>Satisfied</u> with substitutes, they are indeed headed for <u>Failure</u>.
- In these Three messages, Ezekiel spoke about a <u>Vine</u>, an <u>Unfaithful</u> Wife, and three <u>Shots</u> from a <u>Tree</u>, and each of these images conveyed God's truth to those who really wanted to understand.
 - These pictures and parables not only described the <u>Sins</u> of the Nation of Israel, but they also declared her terrible <u>Judgment</u>.
 - One more fact should be noted: These Three parables answered the <u>Complaints</u> of the people that God had <u>Rejected</u> His people and was <u>Breaking</u> His own Covenant.
- 1. The Worthless Vine (Ezek. 15:1-8)

- a. The vine is an image found frequently in Scripture. Jesus compared <u>Himself</u> to a vine and His <u>Disciples</u> to branches in the vine, because we depend <u>Wholly</u> on Him for life and fruitfulness. (Jn. 15)
- b. Rev. 14:17-20
 - i. This reference speaks of "The vine of the earth," a symbol of <u>Corrupt</u> Gentile <u>Society</u> at the end of the age. <u>Ripening</u> of judgment in the winepress of God's wrath.
- c. Jer. 5:21
 - i. The image of the vine is often applied to the Nation of Israel.
- d. Ezek. 17:6-8
 - i. When you study the references listed above, you learn that Israel was a <u>Lowly</u> vine when God planted her in the <u>Promised Land</u>, but by His blessing she **Increased** and prospered.
 - ii. During the reign of David and the early years of Solomon, the vine was <u>Fragrant</u> and fruitful, a witness to the Gentile nations of the blessing of the God of Israel.
 - However, Solomon introduced idolatry into the nation, the kingdom divided, and the Jewish people began to bear <u>"Wild grapes,"</u> instead of fruit for God's glory. (Isa. 5:2)
 - Subsequent kings, both of Israel and Judah, worshipped idols and engaged in the evil practice of the neighboring nations. God allowed the <u>Gentiles</u> to <u>Invade</u> the land and eventually destroy Jerusalem and the temple. The holy vineyard was <u>Defiled</u> and devastated. (Ps. 80:12-13)
- **e.** Ezekiel's contribution to the vineyard story is to point out the <u>Worthlessness</u> of the vine that does <u>Not</u> bear fruit.
 - i. If a tree becomes useless, you can at least cut it down and make something useful out of the wood.
 - ii. It is good for only one thing, and that is fuel for the fire. If the wood was useless **Before** it was thrown into the fire, it is even more worthless **After** it had been singed and marred by the flames.
- f. The vine was burned at both ends and in the <u>Middle!</u> The inhabitants of the Holy City certainly went from the "Fire" of invasion and assault to the literal fire of <u>Destruction</u>. (2 Chron. 36:19)
- g. Those of <u>Us</u> who are branches in Jesus Christ, the true Vine, need to take this lesson to heart! If we fail to abide in Christ, we <u>Lose</u> our spiritual power, wither, and fail to <u>Bear</u> fruit for His glory. (Jn. 15:6; 6:37; Rom. 8:1)
 - i. The image of the burning branch is that of a worthless life, a life <u>Useless</u> to God.
- John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist church, prayed, "Lord, let me not live to be useless!"
